The purpose of emergency assistance provided by the RCC Foundation is to aid students with unforeseen and uncontrollable (emergency) expenses that jeopardize completion of their education. Emergency disbursements are grants, not loans; they are not expected to be paid back. The goal is to provide assistance that will help the student through the current emergency enabling him/her to remain enrolled at RCC. A student may receive emergency assistance only once in a 12-month period. After one year from the date of the award, students may reapply if facing a different financial emergency.

Students in their first semester (whether new or returning after an interruption of one or more semesters, excluding summer) are not eligible for emergency assistance. Students must complete and sign the Emergency Grant Application and submit it to the assistant to the vice president for Student Services at 633-0394 or the RCC Foundation office at 633-0296.
